A Newfound Sense of Purpose



Adam Eligator is in the 11th grade at Charlotte Country Day School. He is a Junior Co-Chair for Youth Council.

Alice deVries asked him about his faith. What follows is his story of his transformative year.

What have you learned about yourself this past year?

I think over the past year I have found who I truly am. I think that because of the incredible family, friends, coaches, and mentors I have in my life, along with a greater understanding of my faith, I have gained a deeper understanding of my personality, interests, perspectives, experiences, and more, all of which contribute greatly to who I am as a person.

How has your faith evolved over the past year?

I think I have experienced a transcendental point in my faith where I have realized that I have been called to serve others through my love for Jesus. Understanding more about myself has contributed to a more solid foundation in my faith, which I think has a major influence in my longing to help my friends and peers through the same journey.

What shifts in perspective have you had about your relationship with God?

I don't think I really lived through God in my everyday life. Instead, I can remember only turning to Him in times of need, as almost a last-ditch effort. I didn't get much out of that because I had not developed a relationship with Him, and didn't know how to trust in how He works in our lives all the time, not just when we think we need His blessing the most. That has since changed, and I now wake up every morning with the goal of living my life through Him to the best of my ability, no matter what is happening that day, and it's a very comforting and calming feeling to have that presence so close to me.

In what new ways do you know and experience God's presence in your life?

I have noticed more of the little things that I otherwise would have overlooked in my life as blessings, and I'm so grateful to be able to see the world like that. I have found that through my deeper connection to Him I can appreciate so much more what I've been blessed with in my life to the point where it's hard to comprehend how fortunate I really am. I have also found a deeper passion for nature. I see that as one of God's greatest creations because of how pure it is, and I have sensed an ability to see more of the good in people through the grace of God that's within everyone.

How has this shift in your faith affected how you live your life day to day?

I feel as though I wake up whole. I'm able to start the day with a purpose, a mission I'm called to live out in my life. It's so rewarding to see a change in mindset in the people that I love, and so I've made a point of sharing my beliefs with my friends and how Jesus has changed me. I think that I live life in a more pure and connected way because of my strengthened faith.

Changing the world one cookie at a time

special part of our Christ Church Preschool & Kindergarten (CCK) curriculum is service. Each year, we have a schoolwide service project in the fall and spring. The goal is to support a charity that serves children while getting our CCK children and families actively involved. This year, our service project took on special meaning for all of us.

One of our staff members, Amy Christenbury, has been involved with Cookies for Kids' Cancer for years, after her son Grier was diagnosed with neuroblastoma when he was 2 years old. She and Grier had the first Charlotte bake sale in her front yard in 2009, and she has been part of the organization ever since. She has organized bake sales, 5Ks, chef events, and much more to raise awareness and money for pediatric cancer research. Two of our CCK families have also been affected by childhood cancer in the last several years, so we chose this organization for our service project in support of them.

In November, we held our first CCK Bake Sale. All of our teachers, students, staff, and parents participated in some

way to support the sale. Toddlers and Twos put Cookies for Kids' Cancer stickers on cookie bags, parents signed up to bake, each class made a sign to advertise the sale, and our four-year-olds even practiced selling cookies in the hallways so that they would know what to do on the big day. Each Threes, Fours, and Kindergarten class was given a time to sell and families came out in a huge show of support.

With the help of matching gifts from Bank of America, CCK has raised over \$20,000 so far. That means we, as a preschool, have raised enough money to fund 200 hours of a scientist's work or to match the government's allotment of funds for five children to participate in a phase one clinical trial. We can't thank our Christ Church community enough for your time and financial support of our service project. We showed our children that it feels good to "Be A Good Cookie" and to help the doctors make better medicine for children.

"We're all transformed and healed together"

ver the past year, members of the Outreach Commission have been engaged in prayerful reflection, looking for ways to increase our learning, nurture relationships, and identify new areas of impact such as care and sustainment of God's creation.

Kathleen Dean recently sat down with commission members Joanne Jenkins, Dawn Osborne and Ned Waller to explore their experiences of reflection, learning, and transformation.

Kathleen: There's a saying that necessity is the mother of invention. That certainly feels apt for the Outreach Commission in 2021 – as it was for 2020. There's been a lot of change, and some of that's been driven by the extraordinary circumstances the world has faced since the onset of the pandemic. Can you talk some about that?

Dawn: The past two years have definitely shaken things loose. The times have been calling for change on all kinds of fronts. At Christ Church, we have tremendous traditions of generosity and engagement with our neighbors throughout Charlotte. We stand on some very strong shoulders in terms of the dedication and accomplishments of folks who came before us, and we want to remain respectful of that work and those traditions. But this has been a moment when we've all had to take a step back and rethink the ways we've done things in the past. That can be scary, but it's also a gift of sorts and an opportunity. We've been able to ask ourselves, "Are our assumptions from long ago still sound? Are there ways we can rethink how we go about outreach and stewardship?"

Ned: One of the reasons I wanted to join Christ Church was that we're a church that can really help move the needle in our community. With dollars, yes, but with all our resources including social capital. That's a tremendous opportunity and chance to really be a part of something compelling. The last two years have made the needs even more urgent, but of course Charlotte's also had a heightened awareness of the divisions and disparities in our city ever since the economic mobility study came out in 2014.

Kathleen: I think another key is the relationships and trust we've built with one another on the Commission, and how there's been a ripple effect of that.

Joanne: Yes, I'm going to say this a lot—everything's relational. We've had the belief that we can do something different. And that belief is rooted in our trust for one another. We've really grown to know each other in the work we do together, and that helped us to take some leaps of faith together. This is a trust walk being guided by the holy spirit.

Ned: The connections we've made with one another also remind us just how intimately connected we all are with

one another. In God's eyes, there is no us and them. We're all human beings. We all need to be healed in our brokenness. We all need to fight together for the common good.

Dawn: Thinking about the transformational power of relationships and the work we can do together really goes in so many different directions. There's the work we can do by getting proximate with our neighbors who are all over this city. And the opportunities we have to connect with other Episcopal churches in Charlotte and with congregations that are racially and economically diverse in different parts of the city. And also with the diocese and Church as a whole. There's such important work to be done, and it takes all of us working together and knowing what's happening so we aren't going at cross-purposes and can take advantage of all the talents and initiatives that are out there.

Joanne: I think we should call it reach across — not outreach.

Ned: Yes, because it's really about all of us and how our connections with one another go both ways and how we're all transformed and healed together. It's not something one group's going out to do for another. It's like the motto of the Augustine Literacy Project that's on the sign at Rama Road Elementary—"Tutor 1 Child, Change 2 Lives."

Kathleen: There are lots of organizations working to bring about change and social justice. Is there something unique in being part of a faith community doing this work?

Dawn: To me, it's about living out our Baptismal Covenant. These are promises made on our own behalf at a very young age. And each time we bring a new generation into the church, we make those promises again – to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves.

Ned: And to strive for justice and peace among all people and the dignity of every human being.

Joanne: I come back to what we said before—there's no us and them in God's eyes. This is sacred work because we're all so intimately connected. It's about healing all our brokenness and honoring one another as human beings who are loved by God, every single one of us.

Kathleen: We're in the season of Advent, a time of hope for transformation and healing. What are your hopes as you look to the year ahead?

Dawn: I'd love for anyone who hasn't read the Becoming Beloved Community vision document put out by the national Episcopal Church to go and do so! It's an amazing blueprint for how we can all begin to live out our Baptismal

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A Story of Race, Truth, and Healing

long with a number of other supporters, such as The Duke Endowment and the Blumenthal Foundation, Christ Episcopal Church will be supporting the making of a powerful documentary whose whole purpose is to drive change. "Mecklenburg County: A Story of Race, Truth, and Healing," as is obvious from the title, is a film with a very proximate, personal content. The purpose is to help us examine our history in a more relatable way that will guide us toward truth and healing. However, it will not only have local meaning. The full production plans include creating curricula for all ages that can help spur conversations and transformation on a nationwide level.

The documentary focuses on two men who share a last name and more history than they knew they had. It is the story of Jimmie Lee Kirkpatrick, who is African American and who was an all-star football player at Myers Park High School. In 1965, he led the football team to an undefeated season, but he was then denied the opportunity to play in the Shrine Bowl because of his color. That led to a very significant civil rights case filed by local attorney, Julius Chambers, which in turn led to the bombing of the homes of four local civil rights leaders in Charlotte.

The documentary also tells the story of De Kirkpatrick, a former white classmate of Jimmie Lee's. When a series of articles detailing these events ran in the *Charlotte Observer* in 2014, it prompted De to reach out to Jimmy Lee, fifty years after they had graduated. Jimmie Lee discovered that their intertwined roots go back much farther than high school. De was shocked to learn from Jimmie Lee that his forebears had been slave owners in Mecklenburg County and that it had been kept a secret for three generations in his family. Some of the slaves were Jimmie Lee's forebears, hence the common last name.

The storyline is told from the perspective of De as he grapples with understanding his past as well as the present. In following the developing relationship between the two men, the documentary takes an honest look at the healing process in De and between them. As Jimmie Lee says to De, "Put aside your guilt and I'll put aside my anger, and we have a chance to learn from each other."

The current time frame for the production of this film is about a year out. It is hoped that this documentary will serve as a catalyst to spur cross-racial conversations that can lead to truth-telling, understanding, healing, social justice and transformation of our culture.

Joanne: I hope that we will keep going in the direction we've been headed in on the Outreach Commission, continuing to deepen our relationships and trust with one another and taking this deeply spiritual journey together while we expand our circle.

Ned: Yes, my hope is that we broaden the community of those who can engage and contribute to the community. That we can take the relationships we've built within the Commission outward and invite more and more people in. Because we really do have the chance to make such a change – for all of us.
